FROM THE EXECUTIVE MINISTER . . .



The editor of 'The Communicator' has been after me for the past week to write an editorial so we can get this issue off to the printer. However, even though I thought about it each day, I was not able to decide on a topic on which I wanted to write. I

thought to myself that I couldn't just write about nothing. But then I thought

that if Jerry Seinfeld could make a show about nothing, maybe I should just start to write.

As I thought about this some more, I realized that I had fallen into the same trap that many of us do in our individual lives and corporately as the church.

We don't know what to do or we are torn between competing ideas, so we end up doing nothing.

In recent years, our theme as American Baptists has been to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world. However, we are not able to accomplish this unless we first start to do something. Often churches talk about their vision for the future and start to get bogged down as they wonder whether or not they are on the correct path. As I work with congregations, I tell them it is better to start down a path and make corrections in the future than to just sit still waiting for

and fretting about the perfect path. As the old adage says, a rudder cannot steer a boat unless it is first moving in some direction.

As we read through the Gospels, we see that Jesus used his disciples to accomplish his purposes. We also see that the disciples often did not get things correct or even fully understand what was being asked of them. However, Jesus continued to lead them and guide them, even in the midst of whatever mistakes they were making.

To begin, begin. Wordsworth

God wants to do the same with us today. God wants us to get into action so that we can be led in the correct directions. The problem with doing nothing is that it can become a bad habit. We might find that it is easier to sit back and wait for signs that never come than to make an effort to move forward using the best information that we have.

My hope is that as we look towards the future, we might realize that we often do not definitively know what to do. But we should not use that as an excuse just to sit back and do nothing. Christ has given us the Great Commission which entails us being active in our world today. If we truly have faith, we will entrust our actions to God, knowing that if we go down a wrong path that God will be there to get us back on track.

WOMEN IN MINISTRY IN HISTORY

On January 22, 1862, Lulu C. Fleming was born. She was the first female medical missionary and the first African-American woman to be appointed as a foreign missionary by Baptists. She served in the Congo from 1886-1899, and died from sleeping sickness that she contracted on the mission field. The American Baptist Historical Society has her correspondence while she was in the Congo and a biographical file which includes photographs.

One hundred sixty-six years ago, on February 28, 1851, Libbie Cilley Griffin was born. She became the first woman on record to be ordained by American Baptists in 1898 in New York state. She was a missionary in India 1873-1876, and in 1883-1893. The American Baptist Historical Society (ABHS) has her ordination certificate, marriage certificate, and many of her sermons and other writings. BEHAVIOR YOU CAN EXPECT FROM YOUR PASTORAL LEADER

Dear American Baptists,

With this letter, we'll begin our exploration of "The Covenant and Code of Ethics for Ministerial Leaders of American Baptist Churches." If you want to see the document as a whole, (which I heartily recommend), go to the website of the Ministers Council (ministerscouncil.com) or ask your pastor.

The Code of Ethics begins with these introductory paragraphs. Note that it is in the voice of the minister who is making the solemn promises.

Having accepted God's call to leadership in Christ's church, I covenant with God to serve Christ and the Church and with the help of the Holy Spirit, to deepen my obedience to the Two Great Commandments: to love the Lord our God with all of my heart, soul, mind and strength and to love my neighbor as myself.

In affirmation of this commitment, I will abide by the Code of Ethics of the Ministers Council of the American Baptist Churches, and I will faithfully support its purposes and ideals. As further affirmation of my commitment, I covenant with my colleagues in ministry that we will hold one another accountable for the fulfillment of all public actions set forth in our Code of Ethics.

The ordained leaders of whom I am one, who sign on to the Code, begin by affirming our vocational identity. We believe we have been called by God into the ministry of the church. Each one has a story to tell about the way that God touched his or her heart and summoned them into this ministry. Your ministers are a community of "The Called."

Your ministers have been called into ministry within the context of the American Baptist Churches. They covenant before God to honor this context for ministry by faithfully supporting our denomination's purposes and ideals.

The Code is primarily a document of behavior rather than theology. The core behavior, from which all other activities grow is this: your ministers promise to "deepen our obedience to the Two Great Commandments." How? "With the help of the Holy Spirit" which declares an eternal commitment to nurture an ongoing relationship with our God.

Your ministers affirm that they are in ministry together. They have entered into a community of sacred relationships. In the first paragraph, they decide that this is a covenant with God. "I covenant with my colleagues in ministry..." Within the context of our American Baptist family, they make a solemn and holy agreement with their brothers and sisters in ministry. They affirm, even celebrate, that no pastor is ever alone in the ministerial journey but each agrees to share the journey with colleagues who have heard and answered the call.

Finally, your ministers affirm that they are in a community of mutual accountability. "We will hold one another accountable for fulfillment of all the public actions set forth in our Code of Ethics." Each one agrees to be accountable to the standards which are set forth in our code.

FIRST BAPTIST ST. PAUL SENDS MISSIONARIES TO BURMA

In early April 2017, Giri Tun Kasuh, Cecilia Oberg, and Mishiah Wah went as short-term missionaries from First Baptist Church in St. Paul, MN, to Burma. They spent several weeks teaching English to students in the Dawei Myeik Karen Baptist Association Churches.

Two hundred ninety students, grades 5 to college, participated in the lessons. Despite the heat and the over-crowded classrooms, the teaching went well. Each of the three teachers re-created her or his plans daily to meet the students' needs. The students accepted a style of instruction that required individual participation instead of straight lecture style. Some singing was included in every lesson, as the students loved to sing and sang beautifully.

IOWA RELIGIOUS MEDIA CENTER CELEBRATES 31 YEARS OF MINISTRY

Iowa Religious Media Services (IRMS) marked its 31st Anniversary at its 2017 Annual Meeting and Re-Covenanting Service held on Wednesday, February 15, 2017, at the Iowa United Methodist Conference Center.

Among those representing the Mid-American Baptist Churches at the gathering were Marshall Peters, Executive Minister; Gary Martin, Associate Region Minister; Jim Laupp, outgoing IRMS board president; David Russell, IRMS board member; Emily Beltrame, IRMS Preview committee Facilitator; and June Peters, IRMS bookkeeper.

In her annual report, Sharon Strohmaier, Executive Director of IRMS, shared several startling statistics regarding the viability of small town Iowa. Half of the

communities in Iowa have populations of 500 or less, 600 towns in Iowa have no schools due to consolidations or closings, and 700 towns no longer have a grocery store. Community gathering places are also at risk – those gathering places include churches. Building on observations made throughout the last three years, Strohmaier reminded the gathering that an elegant solution is one that yields the maximum result in the simplest, most effective manner. IRMS partners in ministry, providing essential resources at a minimum cost, Connecting the Dots between denomination, church and community, and providing the elegant solution needed.

With the challenges faced by churches now, also come wonderful opportunities prompting innovative thought. Those denominations and congregations that will not only survive these challenges but thrive are those that seize the opportunity of every available resource.
